If the outgoing officers do not want to assist in mentoring or training the new officers, reach out to your District Commander, they will have access to someone to help train. In December, the Department had a "Train the Trainers" class. Participants were Legionnaires who had completed the National Legion College or Florida Legion College and were willing to help train within their Districts or Areas. So as an incoming Post Commander, reach out to the District Commander and request the needed training for your team. You can thank the trainers, and YOUR Post will thank you.

This is for the current Post Commanders and their staff, every year at Convention; we award those Posts who are above others in their performance. These awards cover a wide range of items, (See 2021-2022 Post Admin Manual, Pages 64 – 68, "The American Legion Department of Florida Convention and End of the Year Awards" for a listing of awards). However, over the last few years, the problem is that not enough Posts are submitting for those awards. Often, the award winner is the only Post who enters their name. Let us change that and award your team by putting them up for a Department award. Review the Post Administrative Manual, which can be found online at https://www.floridalegion.org/ resources/legion-post-documents/posts/ under Post Manuals.

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



Disaster relief has been a part of The American Legion's identity since the early 1920s when it entered a formalized agreement with the Red Cross to provide volunteer help and raise money in times of

catastrophe.

The American Legion's Disaster Relief Program worked with the Red Cross for about 50 years. Over that time, The American Legion, through local posts, assisted disaster victims with housing, food, supplies, and cleanup.

In February, we observe Americanism month, Presidents Day, and our 4 Chaplains ceremony. On February 3rd, 1943, the four chaplains demonstrated a living example of John 15:13," Greater love has no man than this than a man lay

down his life for his friends."

Their service and sacrifice demonstrated the condition of their hearts for loving God and loving others with the most intimate After Hurricane Camille struck the Gulf Coast in 1969, the National Executive Committee created the National Emergency Fund (NEF) as a one-time initiative to better assist American Legion Family members and posts, with immediate funds of up to \$1,500 for individuals and up to \$5,000 for posts.

In 1989, When hurricane Hugo pummeled South Carolina, the NEF was revived. It continues to assist Legion Family members recovering from natural disasters. Grants of up to \$3,000 each are awarded to eligible individuals, with up to \$10,000 for posts.

Since the NEF's inception, more than \$9 million has been provided indirect financial assistance to American Legion and SAL members, as well as posts. All contributions are deposited in a special account and used exclusively to meet a member's most urgent needs. Not one donated dollar is used for fundraising or administrative costs.

Again the NEF has been activated due to the horrendous Tornados that have devastated parts of the State of Kentucky. Once again, The American Legion has come to the aide of our Kentucky Legion and SAL family. Along with the massive destruction caused by the wildfires in the western United States, donations are needed more than ever before, Tax-deductible donations to the NEF can be made at <u>legion.org/</u> <u>donate</u>. the Department and District Officers. Unfortunately, most of the increase in workflow stems from post complaints regarding Post elections.

We have found in the past that some Posts do not comply with their own Constitution and By-Laws (CBLs) as it relates to holding elections. With most Post elections happening over the next few months, the beginning of February is the time to dust off your latest Department approved CBLs and review your Post's election procedures. There is a wide variety of nomination procedures and voting procedures generally well outlined within the various Post CBLs. Some folks look at the Historian post as a "fill the position with anybody just to fill out the roster ."That's not true! As the Historian of your Post, Unit, Squadron, or Chapter are the eyes and ears to the events happening in your community that affect your Post. You are the official witness for your Post. You should be present at every event that you possibly can attend. Take photographs. Write a short article describing what the event is. Assemble your articles in chronological order.

ometimes it can get tedious, especially if your Post is very active, but you are on the way to assembling your yearbook.

Don't know how to get started? Find the latest Officer's Guide and turn to page #140 to get you on your way.

The legislature is in full swing, and there have been over 3,500 bills filed. Of those bills, several have gained our attention, and we are steadily tracking them for you. Please ensure that you have

signed up for the mailing list to know what legislation The Department of Florida is tracking and what you may be called upon to assist.

On January 19th, the American Legion Department of Florida had their day at the Capitol. The teams began meeting at Post 13 for a "Know before you go" briefing, and you could tell that they were excited to hear what the day would entail. The teams were met by Rep. Anthony Sabatini, District 32, Lake County, who gave them some energy for the day by briefing them on what he was doing on behalf of veterans in the great state of Florida.

As the teams ascended on the capitol building, they were assigned to meet with several legislators, where they discussed veteran issues and sought information about what each legislator was doing for veteran-related issues. The teams were able to provide a history of the American Legion to each legislature member. It was beneficial for both the American Legion and each legislative member.

This year's session has a primary focus outside of the mandatory budget: redistricting. We also are interested in redistricting as this might add or subtract members from our own geographical areas. We will continue to monitor the legislative process through the conclusion of the 2022 session (ending on March 11th) and provide weekly updates. #### Buddy Check results: appreciation, sense of pride, renewals

Ron Rising, Ph.D., read about The American Legion's Buddy Check program in a recent issue of The American Legion Magazine. His response

to the article was, "Our post should do that." So during a meeting at American Legion Post 141 in West Palm Beach, Fla., he brought the Buddy Check idea up to members and "it was unanimously approved," said Rising, a post service officer.

Rising reviewed The American Legion's Buddy Check Toolkit to get started on how to conduct Buddy Checks. "It provided me with a clear and concise approach to getting a Buddy Check program accomplished," he said. He then asked the post adjutant for a list of Post 141 members and made a database of phone numbers from the list. "Once I started calling our members, I soon found out that it was quite time consuming for one person," Rising shared. "I solicited help from our post members and put together a team of eager volunteers. Using the Buddy Check script, we called our members.

"Our response from the contacts we made was overwhelming. Many were ecstatic to hear from us. Nobody was unreceptive. Most were glad that we made an effort to call them. The feedback from the post team members was a sense of accomplishment and pride in a job well done. Not only did we get an idea of the health and needs of our membership, we also were able to clear up discrepancies in our membership roster."

Rising said some members of Post 141 had passed away while others moved out of state, and there were incorrect phone numbers or disconnected telephones. He added that a lot of voicemails were left, which he attributes to caller ID and members not recognizing the caller.

"Overall, the mission was accomplished. Not only did we get a gauge of our post's health, but we were also able to get a more precise snapshot of our post member database," Rising said. "We did get quite a few renewals and members saying they would try to stop by the post more often.

"It was a great experience, and we plan on making a regular effort in the future."

# Fundraiser for local hospice facilities 'ingrained' in Florida Legion Riders chapter

Since 2009, Paul W. Airey American Legion Riders Chapter 392 in Panama City, Fla., has staged what it calls the Hotzee Run, a ride and event designed to raise funds for local hospice facilities.

But the ride took on an even more personal meaning for Chapter 392 in 2015, when one of their own, Mark Long, had a stroke on the ride and would later pass away. Prior to that, though, he used hospice care; Chapter 392 arranged for its members to ride by the hospital where Long was staying so he could hear the roar of their motorcycles.

After that, the Hotzee Run was renamed the Mark "Flash" Long Memorial Hotzee Run and has continued to raise money – now well over \$130,000. Not even the pandemic could stop the Riders from fulfilling what they view as a mission.

"It never crossed our mind not to do the Hotzee Run," said Chapter 392 Director Darlene Brock, a member of Auxiliary Unit 392. "It's ingrained in what we do. It's in the fabric of what Post 392's Riders are about. There's never been a question that we wouldn't do the event. "It is a premiere event for (Bay County). We get so much support from the bike community from all over the county, and from (American Legion) District 1. And we had people come from Michigan to see this event, because they're so astounded by what we're doing and what we're doing it for."

ALR 392 Assistant Director Suzanne Patterson, who served as the coordinator for this year's ride, said planning starts in October with establishing a team of Riders, supports and other members of Post 392's American Legion Family.

"It's everything from figuring out where the stops are, to getting a list of community businesses that will donate or have donated in the past, to seeing who can go out and solicit to or create solicitation letters," Patterson said.

"It's figuring out who's going to breakfast or who's going to do dinner. And this year we did something new. One of our members put together a looping slide show that gives credit to the local hospice programs and also showed pictures of all the members that we have lost who were affected by hospice at the end of their lives. There's just so much going on."

Before the pandemic, the Riders would stage registration and the start of the ride at the

Clifford Chester Sims State Veterans Nursing Home in Panama City. But for safety reasons, the ride again started and ended at Post 392.

This year's ride took place Jan. 15 and had around 170 motorcycles taking part. It was open to the public and featured multiple stops where participants played a Yahtzee-type game. Each participant paid a \$10 entry fee; in addition to motorcycles, cars and trucks also were welcome to participate.

A breakfast kicked off the ride, while participants were welcomed back to Post 392 afterward, where a dinner, raffles, silent auctions and live music took place. Everyone who donates to the effort receives a certificate of appreciation from Chapter 392.

With money still coming in, this year's Mark "Flash" Long Memorial Hotzee Run raised \$24,000. All the money goes to Covenant Care and Emerald Coast Hospice in Panama City.

Patterson and Brock said Post 392's entire American Legion Family assists with the effort, noting Sons of The American Legion Squadron 392 provided the food for both the breakfast and dinner this year.

For Patterson, who serves as second vice commander for Auxiliary Unit 392, the ride is an opportunity to thank those who help some veterans through the final stage of their lives.

"My father was a Vietnam veteran, and I joined The American Legion because I wanted to serve the veterans in our community," Patterson said. "Covenant Care and Emerald Coast Hospice affect the end of life of many veterans in this community. At the end of your life, if you don't get anything else you need to be treated with dignity. That's what Covenant does and that's what Emerald does. And they work with volunteers, just like we do. Because we believe in what they do, we want to be able to support them and continue supporting, even when times are tough."


