

Just like any other person with instincts, I decided not to "ride out" the storm in my mobile home near Port Charlotte and proceeded to the other coast to wait it out. As I traveled back to my home halfway between

Port Charlotte and Arcadia, not expecting to find much, if anything, left, I started noticing the devastation left by hurricane lan.

As I approached Desoto County, I first noticed the massive damage done to the Desoto prisons, remembering the bluetarped roofs just a few years back after Irma. As I passed through Arcadia and headed south on highway 17, my hopes were slowly being diminished of finding anything left of my home or even my park after seeing the devastation.

I stopped by Post K-11 and was pleasantly surprised to see that the building, although surrounded by flood waters of the Peace River, was still high and dry. As we all know, that did not last long as the surge from the river completely decimated the post again, with flood waters later in the week at least 12 feet above the flood stage.

As I approached my home park, I was in total shock at the damage and destruction in full view from Highway 17 that Ian had bestowed upon us. Park models and 5th wheels thrown about like matchbox cars, and large oaks and palms snapped like twigs and ripped out of the ground like you're pulling a weed. As I pulled onto my street, I could see that my next-door neighbor's carport had been torn from its support. But as I got the first view of my home, there it was, my motorcycle still standing, without the beautiful cover given to me by the 13th District SAL Commander. Torn beyond repair.

But the house, not a scratch, was visible. The devastation was all around me, but we were safe and secure. I then realized that there was a reason why we were spared. Because we are the ones that people count on during these times. We are the volunteers that help people get through times like this. I am so proud of the action/reaction of the entire American Legion family. You heard the call and reacted; we will continue to react and respond as needed. Hang in there, God Bless.

Attention all Legionnaires, Please read this article in full.

"How does the National Executive Committee work." The National Commander, the five

National Vice Commanders, one National Executive Committee Member, and one Alternate National Executive Committee Member, elected by each Department, comprise the National Executive Committee. Past National Commanders are considered life members; they can join the debate on issues but have no vote. The NEC has the Legion's administrative power, responsible for drafting an annual

budget, approving contracts, and signing off on Legion spending. NEC members are delegates with full voting power during the Legion's Fall and Spring meetings in Indianapolis and during the national convention. In short, the NEC serves as the organization's board of directors.

Leadership

The American Legion is led by its National Commander, five National Vice Commanders, and six National Constitutional Officers.
The National Commander and Vice Commanders help compose the National Executive Committee; and play vital roles during the national convention; the Legion's annual meeting is to establish programs, pass resolutions and make changes to the organization's Constitutions and By-Laws.

Please, if you are reading this article, you must read the "Rules of the National

Executive Committee of The American Legion," Revised October 14-15, 2020, to educate yourself and others. I am here because you, the members of the Department of Florida, voted for me. I am here for you doing the job you, the members of the Department of Florida, asked me to do.

On my last newsletter article, I mentioned the National Convention was voting on Resolution 1. Subject Amend the American Legion Constitution and By-Laws to allow Multi-Year and Rolling Memberships.

This Resolution PASSED. I have since spoken to National Judge Advocate, my question

was: "Since this resolution has passed, what does the Department do?" His answer was "Nothing at this time" What will happen next is the study of the feasibility of the change, and if it will be cost effective? For Posts wondering what they need to do, there is nothing to do at this time. No need for Changes in the Department Constitution and By-Laws, no need for changes in Posts Constitution and By-laws. National will let everyone know if and when the change will take place so we can update our Constitution and By-Laws at that time.

As I indicated on my last article, National held our Fall Meetings October 813, 2022. There was a lot of information that came from the meetings, one of the items that came out is the attendance and assistance for the meetings and calls of the National Commissions, Committees and Boards. One of them is the National Security Council, which has 500 members on it, however, when a call goes out to contact their Senators and Congress members, only 100 members reach out to their Senators and

Congress Representatives. My point is, if you accept a position, on any Committee or Board, or even in your Post and District, do the job. Otherwise resign, so someone else can complete the needed tasks.

I also want to thank the number

of Departments who are sending supplies and funds down to Florida. Through your actions, you show what the American Legion is about.

A resolution passed unanimously at the Fall NEC meeting in October of 2020, establishing a 2-year contract with Chip Ganassi Racing sponsoring an INDYCAR at \$3.5 million per year. At the Fall NEC meeting this past October, a 3-year extension to the agreement was unanimously approved at \$4.5 per year. The purpose of this high-profile marketing investment is to shift brand perception, grow membership, support the "Be The One" campaign for suicide prevention, and drive revenue.

Some of the reasons INDYCAR was chosen include:

- Approximately 57 million fans
- Average TV viewership is 1.2 million, with 19 million viewers a season
- 2.5 million followers across INDYCAR social media channels
- Audience is military friendly: approximately 70% are serving or have served in the military and contribute to military/veteran causes
- One of the most affordable sports marketing properties, as 2022 was the

most watched INDYCAR season in NBC's history of broadcasting the sport and the sport, is experiencing massive growth.

· Hometown ties to Indianapolis

Some of our return on investment to date include:

- \$55 million in advertising value in two years
- NBC's total airtime for The American Legion in 2021 was 1 hour, 3 minutes, and 54 seconds. After adding the "Be The One" campaign in 2022, total airtime increased by 100%
- Traditional new membership was up 12% since the campaign began, and the smallest net decline in membership in over a decade was achieved, indicating positive membership results.
- Penske Entertainment donated a NO COST, 3-year contract with INDYCAR to be An Official Charity Partner of INDYCAR (2022-2024)
- Received commitments for \$3.7 million in new donations directly attributed to the INDYCAR Partnership including Jimmie Johnson's \$1.5 million pledge; Chip Ganassi's \$500,000 donation and 1,000

race tickets (\$45,000 value); Chip Ganassi Racing donation of 5 liveries (\$1.3 million value); Carvana's \$5,000 donation, a new car (\$25,000 value) and 2 liveries (\$500,000 value); Blake Shelton/Jimmie Johnson fundraiser raised \$13,353 (plus \$5 million worth of PR value).

The American Legion Mobile Marketing Truck was open 42 days across 15 different race weekends in 10 states resulting in 1,861 people signing up to learn more about The American Legion; 253 people donated onsite with an average donation of \$26 and 221 new members from 31 states signed up.

Jimmie Johnson also appeared in two 30-second PSAs promoting The American Legion that were aired by TV stations nationwide an average of 11 times per day in 2022.

To support paying for the increased cost of this extension, the national marketing team is reallocating money from underperforming marketing programs, which has resulted in their budget being \$1.3 million less than their 2022 budget.

always good if the district gets involved in making the Buddy checks with the post. I would also like to add when doing a buddy check, that it is a wellness check, also. When doing a buddy check, "Be the One," let the veteran know they are not alone; they have a friend who's got their six.

I believe that the best recruiting tool we have in our Arsenal is working with the

American Legion programs. I don't care which one of the programs you choose and you work, but by doing that program, you are putting your legion out in the community. You're letting the community see what we do and what we are all about, we are not about staying in the lounge and entertaining ourselves.

District 1 and Navara post 382 just had a very successful project that released a suicide prevention event for the community. Not only did this event raise funds and awareness of the Veteran's suicide initiative, but there were 22 new members signed up at the event. Getting the word out into your community does more in my mind to help membership than anything else we can do, and it's repeatable year after year.

With a membership goal of 55% by October 5th, I would like to congratulate District 1 on achieving a 55.9% by October 5th. District

2 is not far behind and is very respectable, 53.01%. I'm very honored to be the area commander for these two great districts and the progress being made, and not just membership but all areas of becoming a true American Legion Post.

I would also like to recognize what we call a little Legion, Post 378, for their inaugural "Children with Cancer ride." This ride raised awareness that only 4% of the funds go to Children's Research for cancer, which is not nearly enough. The legion is located in Gulf Breeze; the ride was so successful that the City of Pensacola came and recognized them through a proclamation for the Post. Outstanding job by Post 378 Riders. This post is on the rise.

I'm always available to help, and work the program unless it continues to grow. For the "Cause, not the Applause."

A special thanks to Commander Randy Holyfield for his quick response and efforts, and a tremendous thanks to Commanders Eric Nestler and Bob Ordner, whose commitment and teamwork put together the massive effort from the 16th District. In my last article, I asked you to develop your "Americanism Plan of Attack" to ensure program success. Based on that article, I received several inquiries via phone calls and email messages from various Posts seeking guidance on how to conduct or effectively manage a program – and I was thrilled to assist. If you recall, I mentioned reviewing the Department 2022-2023 Event Timeline, which breaks down key events/goals by month. It is a great tool to use. By now, I hope your District Americanism Chair has reached out to your respective Post to help you with your Americanism Plan of Attack.

October is in the rear-view mirror, and by now (hopefully), you have contacted the schools in your locale to introduce yourselves (your Post) and let them know about the great opportunities the American Legion has available to help their student body. Remember, through our programs; we can influence those young minds, promoting

Americanism. Additionally, your presence in the schools and at different community events go a long way. Most schools already have sporting events like football, wrestling, and volleyball, to mention a few. In addition, most Debate Clubs already have meets scheduled, as do Marching Bands and Drill Teams. Yes, they too compete, and these are ideal venues for you to represent your Post while supporting your community - and do not forget to wear an American Legion shirt or ball cap. Please make yourself known, stand out, and let them know that the local American Legion Post is there rooting them on. November 14th-20th is American Education Week, another ideal reason

to have good communications with the schools. You see, there is always something encompassing Americanism. Lastly, have you contacted your District Chair to let them know if you are holding any Americanism events? If so, invite them to attend.

Communication is paramount in conducting Americanism Programs. Keep the dialogue going with your schools regularly, and make sure that your Post is known in your community. A PDC, who I highly respect, is always saying, and I quote, "If your Post was gone tomorrow, would the community miss you" Unquote.

I would like to emphasize that the JSSP Postal Target Orders are well underway. The deadline for registration is Dec. 14th. The time quickly passes, and I cannot stress enough

how important it is to get to your schools or teams that have a marksmanship program to register early. The deadline to register is Dec. 14th. Registration and payment are made online through the Department or National website with a credit card.

The Legion Post Commander/Officer must see the document receipt/certificate for the background check and Protect Youth Sports training prior to signing the Post Affiliation Form. Since this part of the registration takes a little time, it's important to ensure that your sponsored team has this step completed before you sign the form. I have had several individuals contact me regarding Legion Posts, which have a marksmanship program at the post. Although I have had several posts contact me regarding a startup program, I have not had anyone advise that they have already started their program. The startup and operation of a marksmanship program is on the Department website and is a great guide to putting one in place.

As a backup to any request regarding current programs, I refer to the Civilian Marksmanship Program website as an excellent source to find active youth clubs that offer Air Rifle Programs.

I wanted to touch on two topics for this Legion Link item.

The first is Disaster Preparedness. IAN has devastated the majority of the state of Florida, especially along the path it took, starting in the Ft. Myers area. I have seen the aerial views on the news, and I am reminded of when Michael devastated the 1st District and Second District while I was Western Area Commander. There was a significant amount of time between the storm ending and when relief efforts were able to get through to those who needed help. We have a Disaster Prep team in place, and they are closely monitoring the situation.

We need to coordinate our efforts through Chairman Hoppner because we do not want to interfere with ongoing First Responders Rescue and Recovery efforts. I know that damage is extensive to at least 5 of our posts. I am sure that Chairman Hoppner and the Area and Zone Commanders affected will have plans in place and can tell us what to bring and where to take them so that they can be routed to where they are needed most. Stay current on communications within Legion Media Postings to know what to do. Also, be very careful about transferring money. Make sure you use safe and reliable methods to get cash donations into the areas. I thought that the recovery efforts for Michael were very good, wellorganized, and very effective. But it was several weeks before traffic was allowed into the area due to safety concerns on the damaged roads. When the time comes, we need to be ready or have already delivered our help to the distribution points.

Now is not the time to ignore Blood Drive efforts, the second topic of this Link item. I can only imagine that getting the needed blood to anywhere in the southern part

of the state may become a critical need and difficult task while recovery efforts are ongoing. Get your posts organized to support blood drive efforts. Make sure each member that donates individually outside of Post Events lets the Red Cross or One Blood know that the donation is on behalf of the Legion Post they belong to. For Post sponsored Blood Drive events, this is not as important, and the number of pints will be counted and attributed to the post through the event. Every Post should have a Blood Drive Chairman or a Blood Drive Coordinator. This is the time when we can come through for those who need help.

As you can see, the internal portion of National Security is in full operation after IAN. It is one of the 4 Pillars upon which the American Legion was built, and now is the time for the posts that can help to let our communities know that the Legion is here for them.

Lessons Learned

In September, I attended the Americanism Conference in Indianapolis. Here we are above in our group photo. Dave King, Department of Kentucky, was the Conference Chairman. A resolution proposed by the Department of Illinois to reduce the time for the Prepared Oration to 6 to 8 minutes instead of the 8 to 10 it currently is. Additionally, the resolution asked that the number of Assigned Topics be reduced to two instead of the four it is now. Their argument was that students are involved in many sports and activities outside of school and doing this much preparation was arduous.

All Departments agreed that there was no need to reduce the time for the Prepared Oration as often, students could easily go over the 10 minute limit.

There was some discussion about reducing

the number of Assigned Topics to two. This would mean that students only have to prepare 3 speeches to be competitive—the Prepared Oration and two Assigned Topics. There was quite a bit of support to reduce the number of Assigned Topics but it would have to be introduced as a separate resolution and likely will be introduced next year.

Most people felt that making the contest easier, was de facto dumbing it down. Since the National awards were just increased significantly and the number of students who can compete in the semi-finals, most people thought this was not the time to be making the contest easier.

Some believe that homeschooled students have an unfair advantage because they don't have to participate in all the testing and be in class like other students. They argued that reducing the Assigned Topics would go a long way to giving regular school students

some reprieve.

The contest is in its 84th year and while participation is lower than other programs, like Boys State and baseball, we don't want to dilute the importance of it.

Another topic that was discussed was the importance of following the script and running a contest that is very similar, if not identical, to the National contest. Florida makes me proud as our manual and our contests are run exactly like the nationals. We were told to follow the script precisely and if you are going to do any adlibbing, do it before you start the script.

This past year, I was asked to be the Moderator at a Quarter Finals contest. I was psyched. No joke. But, the hotel was getting renovated and the carpets were all messed up. Many chairs were broken or unsteady. My assigned timekeepers

and one escort did not show up. I was busy taping down the carpet so no one would trip. I felt pretty sure I knew the script since FL follows it anyway. The contest commences and one judge they assigned me is mentioned in the next paragraph. I asked her to remove her cap and she refused. THAT was not covered in the script. I was a little rattled by it but thought, okay, just keep on. Everything was going well and then we got to the Assigned Topic portion and my script had the Assigned Topic written out in Roman Numerals. I blanked out. I wasn't even sure I could see it correctly. The Xs and Vs seemed to run together. I didn't want to read it wrong so I paused and fortunately, the timekeeper read it out for me! Our FL script has it written out in words but lesson learned!

Now the issue was raised that at the Nationals, an American Legion member was asked to be a judge as there was a shortage of judges. She had her cap on and refused to take it off because it would mess up her hair. Dave King said that is NOT to happen again and reminded us that it's best to not have Legionnaires as a judge except in extenuating circumstances. I had politely asked her to remove it, but when she refused, I did not know how to handle it without creating a scene. At our contests, I choose judges and get to brief them beforehand so that would never come up. This led to further discussion about the national contest.

At Nationals, we had one person do all the briefing of the judges and he ended up giving some erroneous information to them. The fix for this situation is that each moderator will get to meet with their timekeepers and escorts and judges ahead of time, instead of having them briefed by someone else. The hotel where the contest is held is huge and it's very busy. I had been assigned an escort who was using a walker and was very slow and could no way get the students to the holding room and back

on time. It was pretty chaotic. But, we were coming back after missing a year or two from Covid and we have a new Program Director there and this was her first time organizing a contest. Thankfully, you can count on veterans to step up though and do whatever it takes to make it happen.

On a more local level, every department says it's difficult to reach the students to increase participation. Using social media can help drive up interest. But in the end, it often comes down to having a chairman who gets to know a few teachers and build on that. When we have chairmen who have been involved for a year or more, it makes it easier to forge those connections. While change can be good and invigorating, there is something comforting about having the same chairmen. It takes a few years to build solid rapport with some teachers.

One way to demonstrate to teachers what the contest is about, is to have teachers be your judges. Once they see a contest in person, they have a greater sense of which students might be up for the challenge. I try to get at least one judge who uses social media and can tweet about the contest to their followers. Try to get former contestants from your area to tweet or make a Tik Tok video. Or post on Instagram.

One aspect I have struggled with is focusing on the schools that have speech and debate teams. It's easier to get students from those schools, but the students who may really need scholarship money often come from schools that have no speech and debate

team. It's important not to neglect those schools.

Stress that participation is a great learning experience, that it doesn't matter if you win or not. I think inviting teachers from these schools to be a judge, will go a long way towards promoting the contest at their schools.

One other issue that came up at the conference was....who can be an Oratorical Chairman? It turns out, that Alaska has had a lady be the chairman for many years but she was not a Legionnaire. She was a member of the Auxiliary. I believe the Department of GA has a Son's of the American Legion be the Department Chairman for many years. He's a retired federal judge. The general consensus was that if you have a person willing to act as a chairman, then take advantage of whatever they will do, provided they abide by the rules and regulations and that they coordinate with the other chairman and Program Director frequently.

Thanks to everyone for all that you are doing to make the program successful. I think we have some students returning this year who competed last year and will make for a very good Department contest. Feel free to text or email with any questions. If you need a conversation, text me to arrange it.


DISTRICT ADVOCATES ARE NEEDED

It seems as if we've just wrapped up the Department Convention, and all of a sudden, it's Fall Conference time. With there never being a dull moment in between, I'd like to share that recently, I had the honor to, along with our Department

Commander, present a deserving veteran with membership in the American Legion family and a new (to him) car! In partnership with Carvana and Jimmie Johnson from the Chip Ganassi Racing team, Barry Gordon, a Marine veteran who had fought successfully against some serious adversities, received an automobile. The event was an emotional moment and a surprise to Mr. Gordon, and he has already attended his first Post 5 meeting. Welcome to the Legion family, Barry.





In line with the upcoming Fall Conference, I'm happy to announce that with our partners at the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs, we have revamped the Post Service Officer class to embrace the duties associated with that position. Along with that, I have sent out to all Districts a list of which posts have dedicated Post Service Officers with the goal of making our services accessible to more of the veteran community.

As many, if not most of you, are aware by now, beginning Jan 1, 2023, those veterans who receive VA compensation will receive an increase of 8.7%. Those who also receive Social Security benefits will receive an increase in the same amount. Please be aware that while this represents a significant increase, it may also put individuals in the position of being required to pay some taxes.

Three pieces of information regarding the legislation: We're asking that you contact your elected representatives and ask for their support with H.R 1282, the Major Richard Starr Act. This bill was introduced by Florida's own Rep. Gus Bilirakis and addresses concurrent receipt issues facing many military retirees here in Florida. Also, you can know that a bill has been introduced that addresses MST claims, making the date of the claim retroactive to the time of occurrence. Lastly, in this area, please also make your voice heard so that the VA opens VA healthcare to WW II veterans without the need for a means test. They earned this recognition and treatment.

As I mentioned in a previous article, in cooperation with the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline network, at-risk veterans can dial a 3-digit number..988..and instantly be connected to one of over 200 crisis centers to receive the help that can often get between the veteran and suicide. Let's do all that we can to help our brother and sister veterans.

In closing this month's article, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone for their unselfish hard work. I'm proud to serve beside you and look forward to seeing you all in Orlando.
