On Tuesday, February 28th, the Department of Florida received the FIRST-EVER National Legislation Awards from the National Commander, Jim Troiola. In receiving this award, it was an honor to stand on stage with the Department Commander, Eunice Butts. You may wonder why the award was presented in February versus the Normal National Convention. This award time frame matches the Legislation year for Congress. The main reason we received the award is our large turnout of calling our representatives in Congress for the PACT Act. Again, thank you for making those calls.

After the presentation, it was our turn to go to the Hill and speak with our Representatives. I talked to Representatives Luna (13th District) and Lee (15th District) and staff from the Tampa and Hillsboro areas. I am happy to indicate that both of these Representatives have a strong military background and are strong supporters of the Legion.

As always, if you need something, please let me know so I can assist.

Senator Tester: You Live Up To Promises You Make to Veterans

Looking ahead to this session of Congress, Sen. Jon Tester had strong words regarding cutting the federal budget when it comes to caring for the nation's veterans.

Addressing The American Legion during the organization's Washington Conference on Feb. 28. the chairman of the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs said the U.S. government cannot renege on a pact it made with those who've worn the nation's uniform.

"Some folks who serve in Congress ... want to roll back the budget. But they roll back the budget; they roll back funding for our veterans," he said. "Don't let them tell you anything different. That's a bad idea. I know about fiscal discipline. But when you make promises to people who served this country, you live up to those promises. We will get that done." There will be a table set up in **registration** to place your book. At the end of judging, please pick up your book starting Friday.

If you cannot make Department Convention, you can mail your submission to **Department Headquarters**, **1912A** Lee Road, Orlando, FL 32810. Your submission must be submitted no later than June 6, 2023

Tester also spoke about a piece of pending legislation fully supported by The American Legion: the Major Richard Star Act. The legislation would allow veterans who are medically retired due to injuries sustained in combat to receive their retirement pay without forfeiting their disability compensation.

"We're going to be working on that, and with your support ... we'll see that baby across the finish line, too," Tester said. "Democracy works when people speak up and make sure their opinions are heard, and The American Legion is right there when making sure that democracy works."

Ensuring the Department of Veterans Affairs has the capacity to treat all veterans also is a priority for Tester. "The VA needs to step up and make sure they have the doctors and the nurses and the facilities, but we need to give them the ability to make sure that happens and that old facilities go away. We've got several bills to do that that I'm pushing on, bipartisan in nature in the United States Senate that we're going to be working on to get done."

Tester said those inside the Beltway, and many others, don't understand the challenges faced by rural veterans. That is why American Legion support was so critical for one specific piece of legislation.

"That's why I am particularly proud that last year we had the largest expansion of VA healthcare ever in this country in a bill known as the PACT Act," he said. "It is a bill that every veteran service organization in this country was their No. 1 priority. Yet it is a bill that never would have passed if not for you. I am here to say to you thank you. Your voice was heard, and we ended up passing a critical piece of legislation that probably impacts the majority of your members.

If each member in a team of ten calls just ten Legionnaires or former Legionnaires, 100 veterans can be reached in one sitting.

- If you don't have a list of current and former members at your fingertips, visit myLegion.org and download the names of members who have let their memberships expire.
- 3. Save the file of members and those whose memberships have expired onto a spreadsheet or copy and paste into a Word file to distribute among your team members. Print several copies of the lists.

Longing for Days of Old

- 10. Leave contact information in case the member or former member can't take the call or needs anything in the future.

Air Force Junior ROTC students from Rutherford High School in Panama City, FL, presented the colors. Retired Navy Master Chief Mack Ellis performed his moving narration of Old Glory. The five students presented inspiring and well-written speeches.

Anna Eskamani – State House Representative in the Florida Legislature. Has a Ph.D. in Public Affairs. She's the first Iranian American to be elected to any public office in all of Florida.

Amy Johns – Chief Justice of the Seminole Tribal Court in Hollywood, FL. She is also a ten-year member of Team Florida for the North American Indigenous Games, where she has won 3 Gold Medals, 2 Silver Medals, and one Bronze for Rifle Shooting. She is a Journeyman Gunsmith and does lapidary, metal engraving, and wildlife photography.

Andrew Steinberg – the 2017 National Oratorical Champion from Boston, where he is an organizer for the Jewish Alliance for Law and Social Action. The topic of his recent thesis was US Veterans who had been deported. Today, he is on the board of an organization called Deported Veterans Support House, and he volunteers his time to serve US Veterans deported to Northern Mexico.

Alexander Weeden, Esquire - When he isn't practicing law at his criminal defense firm in Orlando, he works as a Field Director for congressional campaigns in Florida.

Reverend Co'Relous Bryant – Co'Relous was the 2007 National Oratorical winner and was the first winner from FL since 1948! He was also elected Governor of Boys State in 2007. In 2010 while at NYU, Co'Relous competed at the National College Mock Trial Tournament when NYU finally beat Harvard. While on the Mock Trial Team, he won 25 Outstanding Attorney Awards. He earned his Bachelor's Degree in Political Science from NYU and a Master of Divinity from Emory University, GA.

Elizabeth Barahona – The Florida Department Oratorical winner in 2014. Elizabeth got her Bachelor's degree from Duke and is getting her Ph.D. in history at Northwestern University in Chicago, IL. She works with an immigrant human rights organization in Tuscon, AZ, and she also organizes year-round workshops to help low-income, first-generation students apply for college and scholarships. Elizabeth is a fine example of what the Oratorical Contest was designed to do for students— using her speaking skills and promoting civic duty and education.

Gilbert King – Gilbert King, from Brooklyn, NY, is the writer, producer, and host of the Bone Valley podcast, a 9-part narrative about murder and injustice in the 1980s in Central Florida. His book Devil in the Grove was awarded the Pulitzer Prize for general nonfiction in 2013. King has written about race, civil rights, and the death penalty for the New York Times, Washington Post, and The Atlantic.





I want to start by apologizing for not doing a Legion Link article last month. I would like to thank all the sponsors and volunteers of the Veterans Expo. I'm proud to say that each year the results of the Veterans

Expo have doubled in donations and assistance to the veterans and their families. Here are just some of the results.

2023 Veterans Expo Results

- Polk County and Highlands County Sheriff's Department: Provided three (3) patrol cars each for the escort
- Procession was over: 3 1/2 miles long.
- Motley Jeep Crew: Had approximately 30 Jeeps in the Escort.
- Skyway Corvette Club: Had 9 Corvettes in the escort.
- Several hundred people were on the side of the road waving flags as the wall passed by.
- We had the honor of having four (4) queens in the procession, our own Queen State Commander Eunice Butts, Ms. Veteran of America, Ms. Ann Farrel, American Legion Post 69 Queen Bee, who is a Koran War Veteran, and my 13-year old Grand-Daughter Brooklyn a Junior and a Rider.
- When the Wall arrived at Post 69, Thunder the Bald Eagle opened her wings to honor the 58,300 names on the Vietnam Wall and the 300 names on the Global War on Terror.
- Blood One: 8 procedures-10 donors participated = Each procedure can save up to three lives.
- Highlands County Fire Department: Had a fire truck on display.
- Thunder (Bald Eagle Was on site): Overall aesthetic of patriotism.

- Avon Park & Sebring JROTC: Opened the Ceremony by presenting the Colors.
- Cape Coral VA Suicide Prevention Coordinator: Passed out Suicide Awareness cards to everyone who participated in the event, with the signs and symptoms and the hotline number. (988)
- Spirt Training: Had a horse on site; the trainer was on the horse walking around with Old Glory.
- Quilts of Valor: Awarded 8 Veterans with a Quilt.
- Florida Department of Veterans Affairs (FDVA): Was able to submit 37 fully developed disability claims and started 25 more.
- Highlands County Service Officer: Started 35 disability claims.
- Ms. Veteran of America: Was part of the Escort of the Mobile Vietnam Veterans and Global War on Terror to American Legion Post 69. She also sang the National Anthem during the opening ceremony and Lee Green Woods's song Proud to be an American, and was able to talk to hundreds of veterans.
- Amy Green: Received the Project VetRelief VA Employee of the year award.
- Avon Park Rotary Club: Was able to talk to 100 Vietnam Veterans about the Freedom Flight.
- Dr. J Royster Semper Motis, LLC: Talked to 75 Veterans and set up appointments for ten (10) veterans to get counseling for PTSD.
- Kari Russo First Orlando Counseling: Talked to 100 veterans and set up appointments for ten (10) veterans to get counseling.
- Paint 22: Talked to 70 veterans about therapy through art.
- I Got Your 6: Talked to 100 veterans and scheduled 8 to go on a retreat.
- Mission 22: Connected with approximately 200 veterans within two

days.

- Blue Guardian Network: Connected with 15 active or retired law enforcement officers to get counseling.
- Hands for Homeless: Got two homeless veterans off the streets.
- K9 Lines: Because of the Veterans Expo they have now teamed up with 5 more Organizations and started the process for five (5) veterans to get a service dog.
- Wolfhound Legacy: Because of the Veterans Expo, now has teamed up with 5 more Organizations and started the process for four (4) veterans to get a service dog.
- South Florida College: Started the paperwork for ten (10) veterans to enroll in college under the GI Bill.
- National Veterans Resource: We had a mother who just lost her son 2 weeks before the Veterans Expo to suicide. The National Veterans Resource was able to team up that mother with another mother who lost her son a year ago.
- Both mothers are going to a retreat in May.
- Reed Transport Services: Interviewed eight (8) Veterans for truck driving jobs.
- Good Shepherd Hospice: Was able to connect with approximately 200 people, around a dozen people interested in volunteering.
- The Juniors Raised: \$1,300 for Project VetRelief by placing people in jail.
- Donations for Project VetRelief: 14,000
- Riders Poker Run: \$1,500
- We are already starting the planning for the 2024 Veterans Expo which will be Friday, Jan 5th , Sat Jan 6th, and Sun, Jan 7th, 2024.

& Rehabilitation, and Finance, meet for their mid-winter meetings every year at the end of February.

The Sons of The American Legion National Legislative Commission organizes a bus trip each year to memorialize our veteran's monuments in Washington DC on Sunday, the 1st day of the conference. We gather early Sunday morning, just inside the lower level of the Hilton, with over 30 wreaths. Three (3) wreaths for our National Commander to present. (see photos) One at Arlington National Cemetery's Tomb of the Unknown, one at the Vietnam Memorial Wall, and one at the World War II Memorial. There are very few things in life more stirring than standing at the highest point in Arlington National Cemetery, the Tomb of the Unknown, overlooking our Nation's Capitol witnessing this solemn ceremony. The Sons of The American Legion National Commander Chris Carlton, his wife, and two (2) young members from the New York delegation presented our wreath at the Tomb. This year we had three (3) busloads of over 160 American Legion Family members attend. This year two (2) of our FL Legionnaires attended with us, Jim Bowers and Larry Roberts, who are also dual members. We are always looking for more of our Department of Florida Family to accompany us. The next day Monday begins with TAL Legislative Commission Chairman LaCoursiere's call to order, which I attend for almost 4 hours. TAL is still pushing Voters Voice, and Florida was the top Department in Legislative Contacts, and that was because you loaded the QR code, registered, and contacted our Legislators. The Sons of The American Legion National Liaison Mook put on a luncheon for the SAL attendees, which was quite unexpected. Later in the afternoon, the entire Florida Delegation attended TAL "Know Before You Go" this highlights the Legislative Agenda to be discussed the next day with our Legislators.

Tuesday starts very early with the Commander's Call, where CDR Troiola introduced speakers from both the Senate and the House of Representatives from both sides of the aisle. At this meeting, The Department of Florida CDR Butts & PDC Brandt received The National Legislative Commission Advocacy Award for the most Congressional Contacts in 2022. While the contacts are un-categorized, I believe you, the SAL Detachment of Florida, were responsible for a large percentage because we used the QR code at the Conference and in the Source.

Thank you, and please continue to register and contact our National Legislators regarding the Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxins Act (PACT Act) wouldn't have passed without your contacts.

Later that afternoon, PNC Clarence Hill and I visited Florida Sr. Senator Marco Rubio's Office and spoke with his Veteran's Legislative Aide Ryan Rasin. The Senator was at the Senate Intelligence Committee meeting. Ryan was quite well-versed as we reviewed The American Legion Legislative Agenda with him. When we finished, we asked Senator Rubio's aide to make sure to thank the Senator for addressing the Department of Florida Convention and for his support of the PACT Act. and The American Legion Legislative Agenda.

Our next appointment was with Florida's 4th Congressional District newly elected Representative Aaron Bean. PNC Hill knew Representative Bean from his son at TAL Dept. of FL. Boys State and I met Representative Bean in Tallahassee as an FL. State Legislator several years ago. PNC Hill took the lead, and we went point by point through the TAL Agenda, including Mental Health & Suicide Prevention, VA Modernization, PACT Implementation and Oversite, Protection of Veterans from Predators, specifically the Camp Lejeune lawsuits, Parity for the Guard & Reserves, Pay for the Coast Guard and Protecting the American Flag. We thanked Representative Bean, and he volunteered to speak at any of our TAL Posts in the future.

Wednesday is the day that The American Legion National Commander Vincent J Troiola's Testimony before the joint session of the House and Senate Committees on Veteran Affairs. This is where all your hard work as a Son of The American Legion, which you contributed to the \$98 Million dollar total of goods, time, and cash from last year, was reported to Congress.

Please remember that in the next few months why you should be filling out your Detachment of Florida Consolidated Squadron Report (CSI), which will be reported next year. Don't let all your and your Squadron's hard work go unreported. We respectfully request that all Department and Post Officers assist your Squadrons with and include the SAL Squadron Time, Goods, and Money Donated into your Post Consolidated Reports. Think of the Increase in your PCR.

I hope this gives everyone a better understanding of our American Legion, Washington Conference, and our Programs,

Veterans bring life back into historic Florida Post 33 **The American Legion**

The historic home of Frank R. Marston American Legion Post 33 in Pensacola, Fla., had been a vital part of the community with its swing dances for all ages, financial assistance to those in need, a safe place for youth to do homework and more. After years of neglect, and the loss of its charter for a year due to an unfortunate circumstance, the post fell into disrepair. But that is all changing thanks to a group of enthusiastic veterans who saw the history and potential of the post home and the need to reinvigorate it back into the community - both inside and out.

"We love that building but not just the building ... we love Post 33 and the potential of Post 33 as an American Legion post," said Nicole Dickson, second vice commander of Post 33.

Thanks to a \$140,000 grant from Pensacola Community Redevelopment (PCR), the exterior of Post 33 will be rehabilitated, while volunteer work and fundraising efforts are helping with the cleaning and repairing of the inside to create a safe, welcoming space for veterans, youth and

the community.

Dickson said Hilary Halford with PCR helped make the grant possible. "She came to us and said, 'I care about veterans, I care about this building and I want to save this building.' So she did."

Post 33 is named in memory of U.S. Army Capt. Frank R. Marston Jr., who was Pensacola's first casualty of World War I. At the age of 25, Marston died in the second battle of the Marne on July 15, 1918. Before losing its charter more than 100 years later in 2019, the lack of upkeep and care for many years took its toll on the post. In 2020, a group of veterans not affiliated with Post 33 became concerned with its deterioration and began restoring it by hand. This included Dickson.

"I toured the post and fell in love with the building. It's beautiful and it has a stage; I'm an actor by trade. I saw the stage, the dance hall and some of the other veterans and I said, 'this is somewhere I really want to be.' And I really want to help establish the building as a space for community, as a space for veterans and a space for the arts. It doesn't look like any other Legion I've been in; it's so special."

Thanks to the efforts of those rehabbing the post and showing pride in making it an active American Legion post again, Post 33 has its charter back. And construction on the exterior of the post home gets underway in April with a completion time of October.

The grant covers a new roof, paint, rehabbing of doors and windows, and landscaping. And

an iron rail, designed by a post member, will be installed outside the post commander's office with the post number in Roman numerals.

"Watch us grow, watch us change. It's going to go from the ugly duckling to the beautiful swan," said Post 33 Commander Rick Cusimano, who rejoined the post to restore the post and to help invigorate it back into the community. "The post is so important because of its age and history, but also because it's a part of the community. We have to become a part of the community again because if we don't get into the community, people are not going to know we're here."

Right now, the community is seeing Post 33's presence and wants to help them succeed.

Community support

The Pensacola News Journal recently featured a story about the revitalization efforts of Post 33: as a result. Dickson received an email from an Army veteran who is with an electric contracting firm and said they would like to come help the post with its electrical work. "Now that we are getting the word out people are coming together and saying, 'Let's help them," Cusimano said.

For the past two years, Post 33 has been the beneficiary of Old Hickory Whiskey Bar's charity event around St. Patrick's Day, where cocktails are auctioned off. Last year the event raised \$1,800 for the post; this year Florida Post 33 continued on page 17 >>

they almost doubled that at over \$3,500.</pre>

"Two cocktails went for \$1,000. This shows you that the community is supporting this organization. And they should. We are a veteran organization in a military community," Dickson said. "It just makes sense. But half the work is getting the word out."

Dickson said it's thanks to her friend and Old Hickory Whiskey Bar manager Darren Campbell that Post 33 has been the charity of choice for two years in a row.

"Darren has been instrumental in helping Post 33 garner community attention. It's so important to me to have that community support because they are a very wellknown bar in Pensacola, so they have been able to extend our reach beyond veterans, beyond other places in the community."

Old Hickory Whiskey Bar also supported Post 33 through its involvement with Campari liqueur's National Day of Service in September. While Campari donated rollers and brushes, volunteers from the bar and Cusimano's work at Navy Federal Credit Union donated time to paint the inside of Post 33. The painting was completed by students from the JROTC at Pensacola High School.

"It was then that you could really start feeling that you know people do love the building," Cusimano said. "Every time I'm here people stop in and say, 'You've got to save the building' because it's so important."

Legion mentorship

As mentioned, most of the veterans helping in the restoration are new to The American Legion, including Dickson, and younger – in their 40s and 50s. Cusimano said, "It makes me happy that these younger veterans are coming in and they want to do something with the building, they want to do more Legion things. That's important because we're helping veterans, we're becoming part of the community, and we're telling people what the Legion is all about."

Mentorship also has been vital to helping the new members thrive. To help them gain institutional knowledge and understand their leadership roles, Cusimano and Dickson said the support at the post, district and department levels has been outstanding.

"(Western Area Commander) Sonny Decker has been involved with Post 33 from Day 1," said Dickson. "He's counseled us, he's taught us a lot about the organization and how to function as an American Legion. He's just been such an incredible support." Dickson added that other support has come in the form of posts providing volunteers or monetary donations. Their generosity "gives us something to look up to and to look forward to doing of our own one day," Cusimano said.

Even national leadership has visited the post to extend support; National Vice Commander Patricia Harris visited the post with Department of Florida Commander Eunice Butts.

Future of Post 33

The vision of what Post 33 members want to see happen inside the post walls is endless because they have the space. Besides the stage, there's a kitchen with an original stone fireplace, ballroom, and several large meeting rooms both upstairs and in the basement. "The potential for the building is enormous," Dickson said. It even can be rented out for events, which is how David Henderson and his wife joined. They were looking to rent the hall and after speaking with Dickson, they joined Post 33 "and jumped in with both feet."

"I'm excited to be a part of something that is moving forward," said Henderson, Post 33's judge advocate and public affairs officer.

Henderson is looking into establishing

programs at the post such helping feed homeless veterans, hosting craft fairs and re-establishing the school program where kids come to the post to do their homework with the help of veterans.

"In rebuilding the history of Post 33, we want to rebuild the school program part and let people know that we are here and that we can help," he said. "We are focusing on the four pillars of The American Legion and trying to get back to being an American Legion post and service to community through that first and then as a venue second.

"I want to see the American Legion post be that service back to the community. To bring back that reminder that veterans are still helping in the community long after our service ended; we're still serving where our hearts have been. I would like Post 33 to become that shining example of a place where service happens."

Overall, creating a supportive, safe place for veterans, youth and the community is a passion for the veterans of Post 33.

"My husband is a 20-year retired veteran," said Dickson, an Army veteran. "We have seen the difficulty that veterans can have firsthand. For example, navigating the VA or knowing where to go to get VA benefits, to really have a point of contact for something they might need. A lot of us at (Post) 33 feel very strongly about (Post) 33 becoming a place where veterans can go; younger veterans sometimes don't feel they have a place to go and Post 33 wants to be that place. It's really hard when you get out to find the people to build a community with and Post 33 wants to be there for those veterans who are just getting out, who don't really have a community of their own and we want to be able to support them.

"That's really why we all stuck around ... we are that younger generation. When we found each other, we really found a little

family and we just sort of got together and was like, 'OK, we're going to do this together.'''

The post currently has around 50 members and is actively getting a Sons of The American Legion squadron and Auxiliary unit underway. Cusimano believes ones the exterior of Post 33 is complete it will drive people to join.

"As soon as the outside of the building starts looking nice again, that's where the draw is going to come in," he said. "It's going to start attracting more members, but it's also going to start attracting the community we belong to and that's where we're going to start really accelerating in the things we want to get done."

What drives Cusimano to continue the path forward with Post 33 is "the memories the building has with people" and the possibility of once again helping the community through financial assistance. A visitor stopped by the post and reminisced with Cusimano when their grandparents did ballroom dancing there 40 years ago. Then a JROTC student helping paint at the post shared that his grandmother told him Post 33 helped her family monetarily in a time of great need.

"I thought that's the things I want to become a part of again ... we can help veterans, we can help the community, we can be a place for kids to come and be safe," he said. "The biggest thing is just to be a part of everything. Those are the stories that I love hearing and that's what drives me to continue with what we're doing."

If you speak with those helping reenergizing life back into Post 33, you will hear in their voice passion for the post home and a strong drive to be part of the Pensacola community again. This makes it understandable why the community is rallying around them. "Our enthusiasm is kind of infectious," Dickson said. "If you care about that building at all, you're going to join."
