our local Post elections. The answers you seek are as close as your Constitution and bylaws. Most Post's bylaws define why, when, and how we accomplish this task. Your elections MUST be done according to the bylaws, or they could be deemed invalid by someone who wants to challenge them. Some of the basics are that any Legionnaire in good standing can run for any office. Most Posts have a series of monthly nominations with the election certified within 90 days, but not less than ten days of

the Dept. Convention. Again, how you run your elections should be spelled out in your bylaws. Any questions should be directed to your Post Judge Advocate. Most issues can and should be handled within the confines of your Post, but if necessary, I'm sure your District staff would be glad to assist.

As we look ahead, we must all work hard to find people who only have the best intentions for the success of our great organization. There are so many qualified individuals out there that need a little push to take on some of the responsibilities of a successful Post. Community involvement has always been the key. Remember the phrase that defines a successful Post. "If you were to close your doors today, would your community notice?" That's a question all Posts should ask themselves. Comrades, A question comes up every once in a while, how do we, as blue caps, change the workings of the American Legion? The simple answer is a resolution.

The following is taken from https://www.legion.org/resolutions

Legionnaires at every membership level

are afforded the opportunity to suggest changes in their local posts' policies or even to the manner in which the Legion operates as an organization. Legionnaires interested in initiating such a process must file a resolution – a written description of a problem or situation, followed by a suggestion as to how it may be corrected. A resolution may also be a statement of declaration about an issue of concern to the Legion. It consists of two parts: the preamble (description of the problem) and the resolves clause (how the local Post, department, or national organization should

solve the problem or support the issue). The entire resolution should be one continuous sentence, with the preamble clause(s) preceding the resolve clause (s)

You can use the Resolution collection in the Digital Archive, https://archive.legion.org, to search and view current resolutions. Active resolutions within the Legislative Program, https://archive.org/node/, are also included in this collection. For questions about historical resolutions that are no longer the policy of The American Legion, please get

We have completed the 2nd Round JSSP Postal Match, which had an April 1st deadline. Winners will be posted on the National website for the National Competition in Colorado Springs qualifiers in July for the finalist. The First Place Winner will receive a \$5,000 Scholarship, and the Runner Up will receive a \$1,000 Scholarship. Thanks to all our participants and coaches who devoted their time and effort to this competition. Our youth are the future of our country and deserve our support. Recommendations and Instructions Bruce Thurber, Membership

It is important that as we prepare for another year, we eliminate the problems that have occurred this year. One of our worst problems was folks who needed to be correctly registered in myLegion when they assumed a role with access to the post

membership. The most common issues are:

- Members sign up for Legion.org and not mylegion.org; these are completely different areas of the system.
- 2. Members not registering for myLegion with the on-file email address; make sure they are the same.
- Members using post emails to register these links that post email to this person's membership number and cannot be transferred to the incoming officer.
 - Each year, the Department links the newly elected officers to the account with personal emails.
- 4. Incoming officer paperwork not sent to Department.
- Members go online to renew, click on the wrong renewal link, and end up transferring themselves to Post 400.

MyLegion.org Registration

- 1. Go to MyLegion.org and select "register."
- 2. Enter your email in the register window. Click "next"
- 3. Enter your name, check the required consents, and click "next."
- 4. A one-time password (OTP) will be sent to your email address.
- Welcome window, create a password, and confirm.

- 6. Retrieve an OTP from the email, enter, and click "finish registration."
- 7. Click "MY ACCOUNT" to view account information.
- Once registered, sign in, check all your personal information, and update any errors.

Immediately following post-elections, ensure that the Post Officer Report and Post Officer Certification are sent to the Department.

Adjutants, it is time to finalize your CPR if you have not already. It is on your myLegion page.

Because we are not in the targeted time, membership and recruiting continue. Work our DMS and Buddy Check. However, the most important thing in membership is retention. Here are some retention tips:

- Have a program, not a campaign. Retention is a year-round priority and needs to be planned.
- Recognize members who reach milestone membership anniversaries. If members stay in The American Legion for five, ten, twenty, or more years, they are probably not among those who are likely to drop out. When members reach one of these milestones, it provides two retention opportunities for your Post.
- Provide and encourage the use of The American Legion Emblem. There are good reasons for members to want to display the Legion emblem or other Legion artwork. The emblem can be an effective membership and marketing tool.
- When important issues come up, call some inactive members for their opinions. It's natural for Posts to contact their leadership people when a matter of importance arises, such as

- a legislative crisis, a local election, or the setting of a new standard. These issues and events are also opportunities to involve some of the Post's least active members simply by asking their opinion.
- Accept credit and debit cards for dues payments. Credit and debit card payments have become the norm for almost all purchasing transactions.
- 6. Recognize your members as often as possible.
- 7. Get members involved at SOME level. Involved members don't drop.
- 8. Publish an annual report in the local media. Thank the community for their support and send a copy to members. Publishing an annual report (Consolidated Post Report) allows your Post to summarize all the accomplishments from the previous year.
- Get spouses active it assures renewal. When you have multiple family members simultaneously belonging to the Legion, the Auxiliary, and the Sons of The American Legion, your chances of having them renew are much greater than the renewal rates of individual members.
- 10. Hold leadership-training programs. Give your members the tools to be successful volunteers. It is important for members who get involved to have a good experience during their involvement. Leadership training is becoming one of the best services that organizations can give their members. The skills developed through leadership training are transferred back to the members' workplaces. At renewal time, members will remember where these skills were developed.

Her favorite color is red, and her favorite band is Queen, but she also likes Doja Cat's songs. I had to Google Doja Cat, and she is known as an eccentric rapper, singer, producer, and writer who has a great sense of humor.

I asked Nurfat what or who inspires her, and she said that the thought of instability is what inspires her to work hard and keep trying. She knows life won't go according to plan but thinks that studying geopolitics and public policy gives her enough knowledge to comprehend what is happening in her world. She believes that studying religion, architecture, history, and about wars and famine will help her be a better citizen and a good steward of the earth.

US Navy veteran grandfather and played on the Post-13 Legion baseball team last year. He has been accepted to Embry Riddle University to study Aeronautics as a member of the Air Force ROTC program. Will's Eagle Scout service project involved extensive repair to a pre-existing display structure located in the front of Post 13, then design and fabrication of a permanent sign inside the display recognizing all of Post 13's original 37 charter members and veterans of World War I. Post 13 was chartered by The American Legion on June 9, 1919. Ironically, Will's Scoutmaster in Troop 201 in Quincy, FL, Clay Fallis, is the 1986 recipient of the American Legion Department of Florida Eagle Scout of the Year award. Clay's father was a Florida National Guardsman, and his

grandfather was a US Marine Corps member during World War II. Pictured in front of the service project display is John Folson, past Post 13 Commander, past District 2 Commander, and current District 2 Chaplain; the Department of Florida Scouting Chair; Eagle Scout Vislocky; and Dottie McPhearson, a relative of Post 13 namesake Claude Sauls (the first Tallahassee resident to be killed in WW I). The other namesake is Ben Bridges, a fighter pilot and the first Tallahassee native who died in the line of duty in WWII.

2023 Department of Florida Eagle Scout of the Year: I am pleased to announce that the 2023 Department of Florida Eagle Scout of the Year is Brady Kondek of Vero Beach, FL (District 12). Brady earned his Eagle Scout rank with Scouts BSA Troop 171 in Carlisle, PA...chartered to American Legion Post 674 in Mt. Greetings, fellow Legionnaires,

I'd like to begin this article by addressing an issue brought to our attention. Ever since the passage of the PACT Act and the Camp Lejeune

Justice Act, there has been a sharp spike in the number of so-called "advocates" for veterans affected by these pieces of legislation. We've all seen and heard the ads. That said, we can't advise strongly enough to be cautious as possible because what they don't tell you is more important than what they do, not the least of which is that should you become involved, there will be fees, sometimes running into the thousands of \$\$ you'll be responsible for. The

question has to be asked," What am I paying for?". The answer is nothing. You can't get free help from an organization recognized by the Veterans Administration. Please be aware that nobody can guarantee a result, although some groups stop short of doing that and infer it in their pitches. Please don't fall for it. If you feel you fall into one of the categories covered by those pieces of legislation, contact your local American Legion Post Service Officer, the Florida Dep't of Veterans Affairs, or a County Veterans Service Officer.

Continuing a bit regarding legislation, one of the American Legion's priorities is the Richard Starr Act, proposed by Congressman Gus Bilirakis of Florida. This bill will do away with concurrent receipt, meaning that career military personnel penalized by dollar-fordollar reductions in their monetary benefits will no longer have money deducted from

their pensions. It's anticipated that there are literally thousands of our brother and sister veterans who stand to benefit from this, and I urge you to reach out to your local representatives to support it.

We're putting the finishing touches on this year's Post Service Officer class at our Department Convention and have guest speakers who will be addressing the class. PSOs are a valuable asset and resource to the veteran population, and you are encouraged to have a post-member attend. This class requires advance registration; the last day to do so will be May 26, 2023. Registration can be done at https://www.floridalegion.org/news-events/department-convention/classes/

Mission Escort Sandra Gessler, Post 273 Historian



On March 20, 2023, I escorted the ashes of a Vietnam Veteran Martin Boyle who served in the Marine Corps, home to Honolulu, Hawaii and that is when "Mission

Escort" began. With

the support and donations from American

Legion Posts 273, 252 and 158 and reaching out and networking with the Hawaii Department of the American Legion and AL Post



17, we arranged his memorial service and traditional Hawaiian canoe sunset sea burial.

Marty passed on August 16, 2022 on his 74th birthday, he was one of the "22" military suicides that day. Martin spoke in the past that if he died he wanted to return home to Honolulu, Hawaii, where he served in the military, married, had a son, built his first home, rode the waves and wanted to go home and be buried at sea.

Three months after his passing, I was organizing Martin's belongings and found a picture of a young boy with the name of Shane on the back and year. My daughter found Shane Boyle on Facebook and we called him. Shane identified himself as Martin's son and we began communicating with him over the following weeks.

Shane was very supportive of having his father returned home but did not have the funds to do so. That is why and when "Mission Escort" began.

A brief history of how I met Martin. Four months prior to his death, Martin had called the American Legion Post where I was Post Historian and my daughter was on duty at the time and initially took Martin's "crisis" call.

After speaking with Martin and reassuring him we would help in any way we could, and she said I would be returning his call, within a few minutes, which I did. Being late in the day we realized we could not immediately assist him due to the business he needed help with because they were closed for the day, but reassured him that we would be working on his issues once we hung up the phone. Martin, myself and my daughter, Nicole agreed to meet in the morning.

After interviewing Martin, I determined that he needed assistance with medical, dental, independent living skills, finances, transportation to appointments, access to our food pantry in addition to his electric being turned on which was accomplished in the first hour (donation and paid directly by the post). From April to August 2022, I continued to assist Martin with a "to do list" and were making progress rapidly.

Over this period of time we had gotten to know more of Martin's history as a Vietnam Veteran who served in the Marine Corps from 1966-1970. He enlisted in December 1966 at the age of 17 and was shipped to Vietnam in February 1967. In December 1969, Martin returned to the states and received his honorable discharge in January 1970. Martin lived in Hawaii, married, had a child and a few years later was divorced and returned to Boston where he became a Merchant Marine and Captained his own ship.

Martin had no contact with family members in the last 30 years and did not share why. So when he passed I did not know who to contact, we had a small memorial service for him with the honor guard and our Mayor, Mr. Brown attended. I kept his ashes and personal belongings that the Sheriff had me gather the morning of his passing (I was the last phone call on his cell phone and they called me to inform me of his passing). To this day I do not know why I kept his items and ashes as long as I did, but now I know it was fate (3 months later we had contact with his son) and my belief in our motto of "leave"

no one behind".

"Mission Escort" Accomplished





Hawaii American Legion Post 17 assisted with the memorial service arrangements prior to my leaving Florida and once I was there, we wrapped up the planning. Some of those that attended Martin's memorial service were NEC and Past Dept and SAL Commander Francis Russell, Dept Sgt-at-Arms and Post 17 Commander CR Drumheller, Post Adjutant Lt Col USMC (Ret) John DiGiovanni, Vietnam Veteran Chapter 858 President Rona Adams, Dept and Post Chaplain Michael Ferreira and VFW Senior Vice Commander Phil Branch.

The presentation of the US flag was by the Marine Corps Youth League Honor Guard. Adjutant John DiGiovanni presented Shane with a framed certified letter with the date and time that the US flag had flown over the U.S.S. Arizona and a brief history. NEC and SAL Commander Francis Russell presented Shane a membership to the American Legion Post 17 in honor of Martin.

I learned a few things from Martin's son, Shane while I visited with him prior to the

service. First Shane believes that the reason for the 35-year absence of Martin could have been for to two possibilities, in 1968, Martin suffered from Malaria and was in a coma for over a month when he served in Vietnam and had issues with memory loss, and years later while Martin served in the Merchant Marines, he was involved in a serious boating accident which caused traumatic head injury and he suffered again with his short term memory losing the ability all together which ended his career. Shane learned of Martin's boating accident only when legal paperwork was forwarded to the address in Hawaii and he had opened it after a few months (Shane lives in the same home Martin had lived in when he returned from Vietnam in 1970 and married). No one in the Boyle family heard from Martin after this accident for the next 35 years (mom, dad, sister and Shane). Martin's family feared they would never know what happened to Martin during their lifetime (both parents are now deceased). Shane was surprised to learn that Martin had been in Florida all these years because Martin never mentioned knowing anyone in Florida prior to the accident.

The second startling bit of information was when Shane and I arrived at the location of the New Hope Canoe Club, Shane became a little emotional and explained that Martin actually lived at this location for many years. Martin lived on his boat in the bay and worked as a boat Captain. When it is said that God works in mysterious ways, this would be one of them. Martin's ashes were released close to the same location. There is no way that anyone who was planning the service knew this. This information gave most of us chills.

Lastly, Shane also worked for many years near this location and served in the Marines just like his father which sadly was unknown to Martin. When Shane was talking about his great relationship with his father, Shane said he never felt abandoned after the divorce because he spent many summers with his father and considered their relationship as being best friends rather than father and son.

Thank you all for supporting "Mission Escort"
