Just wanted to give you an update on some of the resolutions that came out of the Spring meetings.

There was a total of 25 Resolutions covering VA&R, National Security, Convention Requests,

ETC. All resolutions are available on <u>www.</u> legion.org/archives.

I would like to mention Resolutions 1 and 13. Below are the resolved clauses.

Resolution 1: Purchase of the Multiple Year Membership.

Resolution Reads: Resolved, By the National Executive Committee of the American Legion in a regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on

May 10-11, 2023, That a five-year pilot program offering the purchase of three consecutive twelve-month member terms at the then current dues rate be established: and, be it further,

Resolved that at the conclusion of the pilot program, an analysis be completed to determine if sufficient use and revenue impact warrants a continuation; and be it finally,

Resolved that modifications to the member data system (MyLegion) needed to offer multi-year membership not exceeding \$75,000.

National will be rolling this out soon, and I hope you can use this to help retain membership within your Posts. This will also ease the pressure of obtaining new membership or contacting those who still need to renew.

Resolution 13: "Be the One" Days

Resolution Reads: Resolved, By the National Executive Committee of the American Legion in a regular meeting assembled in Indianapolis, Indiana, on May 10-11, 2023, That, commencing on June 1, 2023, the first day of every month be observed as a special day to reduce the stigma around mental health issues among the military community when all American Legion Family members wear a "Be The One" items to signal their commitment to Be The One to save one veteran: and, be it finally,

Resolved, That all American Legion posts should place special emphasis and awareness on the "Be The One" program on the first day of every month.

More details will be given out at the Department Convention. See you then!

Greetings, for this last Legion Link edition of the year before we launch into a new year ahead. With the year ending, posts are having their voting for the 2023/2024 year. With me finishing this

year as District Commander, and making my visitations, I've had the pleasure of working with all the district's posts. One post needed advice on how their "Snowbirds" could be able to vote before they returned North, but their post does not vote until after they leave the area. And with their CBL outlining the date of their voting I recommended adjusting the voting date to earlier in the year (though not helping them this year). But this would cause them to make an amendment to their post's CBL (Constitution & By-Laws), to which they would have to make a motion (with a quorum present) at a posts General Membership meeting. Thus, by resetting the voting date, that would also adjust their nomination(s) according to the number in their CBL (one or two prior to the voting date, per their CBL). That way they would

be able to accommodate those who wish to be available for voting before they left the area. IAW the Department CBL a post is restricted to voting no more than 90 days and no less that 10 days prior to Department's Annual Convention. This aspect must be followed, but is easily fulfilled. Plus with a post waiting so close to the Department Convention, it makes submission of EOY (End of Year) reports difficult to meet deadlines, or at least very close to it, and some post are voting past the deadline for EOY's. By having a posts voting in say April each year, the post is able to not only forward their EOY reports to HQ in a timely manner, but also their Corporate Annual Report (which is due to the Secretary of State) on Sunbiz.org. That report is due by May 1st each year, and if your post elects their officers after May 1st the post would need to amend their Annual report because of any changes if their officers changed that are in the Annual Report. Having it earlier in the year would avoid this for one, but also EOY reports to Department.

Recap:

Make an amendment to your posts CBL by a motion, have it seconded and have discussion, then vote. Once that is successful, adjusting the

by the number in their CBL. This would require gaining advance input from your post members, and what would work best for the post. But you must follow the posts CBL, that is why an amendment to it is necessary. Afterward, notification to Department about that amendment because it adjust the CBL on file at Department. Not only would you notify about this change (which would be in the posts meeting minutes), but also when their post (every 3 to 4 years) submits review and changes to the Department JA, these and any other amendments would be interlaced within the posts CBL for updating at that point. All and all your posts CBL must be followed but making it suitable for your post to operate and function in a manner that is amicable for the post membership.

Note: When your post has their voting of officers, if you would ask everyone that potentially may be elected (if they are on the nominations listing) bring in their DD-214's. That way the Post Officers Certification report can be completed then and there, instead of trying to gather their verification later, and holding up one of the EOY reports which is due to Department by June 1st. This is one of the reports that are time-consuming, thus causing delays.

Hurricane season is upon us again. The season runs from June 1 to November 30 of each year. When we reflect on last year, Hurricane lan, a category five (5) cyclone, damaged the west coast of Florida. It

was the 3rd largest storm to hit since 1936 and the largest storm to hit North America, with loss of life and 113 billion dollars in damages; in the aftermath, the west coast is still rebuilding and will continue to rebuild for years.

This brings us to the question, are we prepared? We have a responsibility to keep ourselves and our loved ones safe. When an order to evacuate is given, it should be obeyed. Evacuation orders are delivered for those in the cone of uncertainty to move to a safer place away from the storm. Time and time again, we see individuals who do not heed the word of the orders and put themselves and First Responders at unnecessary risk. I will stress that during this hurricane season, your safety and the safety of your loved ones are the number 1 priority.

We should focus on things that are important to us. Do I have homeowner insurance, and is

it up to date? A significant setback was flood insurance; many homeowners did not have it and were liable for the damages caused by flood waters. If you don't have insurance, this is a good time to decide to get it before a storm hits. It takes a policy 30 days to go into effect. Do you have all your important documents in a safe place with easy access if you have to leave, such as your birth certificates, insurance policies, etc.?

JROTC Year-End Reporting/JSSP State Team Winners

The majority of the JROTC Units have completed the Year-End Award Ceremonies and Military Balls. I've had the pleasure of attending several of these events and would hope that other posts

have been on hand to present awards to these deserving cadets. The two (2) medals awarded to the JROTC Cadets are the Military Excellence and the Scholastic Excellence Bronze Medal and Certificate. On review of the Year-End Reports that were sent out by the Department for the Addendum - CPR, lines 50 (Military) and 53 (Scholastic), there were many times the number of medals did not match. These are usually ordered in pairs and presented to the two individuals selected by the instructors based on the cadets' achievements. So far, the number of schools reported for post sponsorship was 23 for the Department. I hope this number

is increased by the end of the reporting year. For example, the number of schools in Florida, Broward County alone has 31 JROTC Programs. Children and Youth is one of the Legion 4 Pillars, and there should be a much higher number reporting for the Department of Florida. The JROTC Program has a heavy involvement in the community. For example, Fleet Week was held in the first weeks of May, and many schools visited the ports for ship tours and other events. Please share this information with us if you had any of

It has been an honor serving the Department of Florida as Membership Chairman. This year we struggled with the New MyLegion. Having had many obstacles, many are still unresolved;

however, progress is being made. Each month National holds training. To find this training, go to Legion.org; in the search bar, type "Training Tuesday," and a list will appear. Click on the item you are interested in. So far, this is the best instruction that has been put out to help us.

In the effort to increase connectivity with post 9/11 Veterans in and outside of your membership, try using a simple approach: cater an evening around these veterans and invite them to the post to learn about The American Legion, what you are doing

in the local community, and how they can be a part of it. While all veterans and their families are welcome, the focus of the night is to connect with post-9/11 veterans, enjoy camaraderie, networking, and have a good time with one another. Have members take a moment to briefly highlight what the Post is doing locally, both independently as well as in collaborative work with other veterans/non-veteran organizations throughout the community, and how the post-9/11 generation can become involved.

Post-development and revitalization (PD&R) allows The American Legion to reassert itself in the local community. The 21st Century Report states there should be an American Legion Post near every high school, and we are trying to meet this challenge. If there are communities that do not have a post within it, post-development is a great way for The

American Legion to become an asset in the local community. There are times when membership in a local post has declined, and interest in the programs is nonexistent. A revitalization effort can help reenergize and breathe life back into a post so the post can become viable again.

The Buddy Check program was launched in March 2019 as a "comradeship campaign" to encourage posts to reach out to veterans in their areas – members, former members, and others – to see what The American Legion could do for them. The program was successful in its first year and potentially lifesaving in 2020, through the COVID-19 pandemic and as winter months drew near, affecting the mental health and well-being of isolated veterans. American Legion posts throughout the country have assembled and are assembling; Buddy Check teams to safely contact local veterans and their families by phone, email, text message, and

personal visits to see what help they may need. Three toolkits are available for posts developing their Buddy Check programs. The original kit provides basic guidance about contacting local veterans and letting them know that The American Legion is there for them. A second toolkit focuses on Buddy Checks to help veterans through the COVID-19 pandemic. The most recent toolkit emphasizes the importance of mental health, well-being, and suicide prevention. As I worked this year, I needed help, and I would like to especially thank JoAnn, Rachel, Jennifer, Carrie, Marcus, Bekki, Lois, and Bobbi. I know the Problems - What are the Solutions?

Well, I was sitting around the house thinking about what I could make this month's Legion Link item about. I started the year talking about immigration reform. Everything was supposed to fall apart

at midnight on the 11th or 12th because Title 42 was expiring. So far, in just three days, illegal immigration numbers are down. I think it is just because the ramifications of failure are much more severe. If you are illegal and ask for asylum and have not followed the rules, you are not only turned back around but you are also forbidden from making another attempt for five (5) years. For anyone really trying to get into the USA, this is a stiff penalty. Requiring immigrants to seek asylum in every country along the way makes sense as well. Finally, using US troops to support the admin functions and freeing up the border patrol folks to defend the borders will also help reduce illegal immigration. We must continue the efforts. The lack of a solid immigration policy and its ramifications for America, like fentanyl deaths, overcrowding and over demand for support from local, state, and federal governments, unrest over misconceptions about illegal immigrant voting, receiving entitlements and other financial burdens, makes us appear weak to other countries

and causes discontent among our citizens and leaders.

There is another attack going on in America. Lack of a clear definition in our decisionmaking and international relationships. Terminating agreements that we have had in place for a long time, not supporting our allies, ultra-aggressive partisan politics that take control over every aspect of governing, with no concessions or bipartisan agreements resulting in a Government that cannot make a decision. The biggest example of this is the debt ceiling. One party takes power, the other complains and impedes, and eventually, the power shifts and the former weaker party now hammers the other party that hammered them. There are no bipartisan agreements or compromises, so that no middle ground can be found. And now, people who worked for and earned their retirement funds are being wiped out by inflation and taken away because the government ran out of money on June 1. Our enemies are just waiting for it to happen. China is getting ready to buy up all our resources and make a fortune by gouging us on Chips and Pharmaceuticals.

Finally, we really need to make sure we do our National Security programs. The Legion will fall without its pillars, and a strong national defense is one of them. Get your blood donor programs going; the Veteran Volunteer hours at VA centers increased. Donations for Disaster Preparedness

programs need to be going year-round, not just during hurricane season. We have been called on many times by our neighboring Departments, and they have also come to our aid. Fires, Floods, Tornadoes, and Hurricanes are becoming more prevalent. We need to support our ROTC programs, Scouting, and other similar programs.

I have served as a Post Commander, District Commander, Area Commander, and Department Chairman. Most of the time, I looked for solutions to the problems, not someone to remind me what the problems were. I am still looking for solutions and need everyone's help to get us moving in the right direction. This is my last Link Post for this Legion year. Thanks for listening, and keep up with your programs; get your elections done and get some training at the convention or online in the boot camp.

The end of this month marks the close of another chapter for PROJECT: VetRelief, as we officially end our 9th year as a program. Last year, we reached significant milestones, serving 1,000 veterans and providing \$1,000,000 in financial aid. This year, we set records for number of veterans served per year and amount of support provided in emergency assistance!

Our support statistics are always listed at the bottom of our Legion Link articles, but we are already over 100 additional veterans served this year, and we still have 2 months left of our fiscal year!

Based on our monthly averages, we should anticipate serving approximately 60 more veterans with an additional \$70,000 in assistance over the next two months. Therefore, we are projecting to assist 370 veterans with over \$417,000! For reference, last year's totals were 202 veterans and \$222,300.

Although these record-high stats are impressive and something we are very proud of, it also emphasizes the importance of funding for our programs. You see, PROJECT: VetRelief solely functions on the generosity of others, largely from The Florida Legion Family. Without it, we would not be able to support the high-demand of our veteran community.

Our support numbers are proof that our veterans need us, so we hope that you will continue to provide the necessary funding to give us the ability to be there for them.

The three winners are:

1st Place: Haley Bock, Indianapolis, IN, a home-schooled senior sponsored by Post 3. It was her third time competing in the contest but the first time making it to Nationals. Her brothers have competed in the contest as well.

2nd Place: Ian Chung, Vestal, NY, a junior at Vestal High School, sponsored by Post 1645, Binghamton, NY. Ian made it to the semifinals last year at the contest, so this was his second time competing.

3rd Place: Emma Johnson, Powell, WY, a junior at Powell High School, sponsored by Post 26, Powell, WY. Johnson also made it to the Nationals last year but did not make it past the quarter-finals.

The three winners gave speeches that were all great but very different. Emma Johnson derived her speech from the award-winning musical Hamilton. She had been shown the musical in her history class and was captivated. Her speech focused on three distinct American notions: the process towards compromise (Congress take notes!), the importance of upholding

a legacy, and the obligation to fulfill the duties of the people in support of the Constitution. Johnson took the stage and adopted a stance like a cowgirl, feet planted firmly apart like she was about to challenge someone in an old-fashioned duel. It was deliciously obvious she was from Wyoming, wearing slacks and practical, slightly clunky boot-type shoes and speaking in a folksy, laconic manner. You'd want Emma Johnson to be their teacher if you had kids in school.

lan Chung, the runner-up, had given his speech in the quarter-finals that I had moderated. I also watched him in the semi-finals as he was in the contest along with the FL Department winner, Nurfat Ishague. Ian made it to the semi-finals last year and was confident and experienced. His speech focused on the delicate balance between tyrannies of the minority and the majority and how our founders desired to prevent tyranny. He stressed that in order for the Constitution to function as intended. people need to participate in the democratic process and defend American constitutional ideals. And not just on social media. Okay, lan didn't actually say that in his speech, but he said that when we were talking in the hallways. After our quarter-final contest, lan was joking around behind a podium and giving an impromptu speech to the hotel owners about the lack of good food and amenities at our hotel. I feel sure he was a class clown at Vestal High School.

Haley Bock took the stage, and quite honestly, I knew from the title of her speech that this would be different. "The Black Hole of American Democracy: American Territories are Where Voting Rights Vanish." She wasted no time introducing us to Luis Segovia, a US Citizen who lives in Guam but served tours in Iraq and Afghanistan with the Illinois National Guard, the US Army, and the Guam National Guard. She explained how Segovia, along with four million residents of the American Territories of Puerto Rico, Guam, the US Virgin Islands, and the Northern Mariana Islands, are being denied their right to vote.

I consider myself a fairly educated citizen and politically active, but I confess right here that the stuff Bock was talking about was all new to me. *Insular Cases. Territorial Incorporation Doctrine*. This was never brought up in any history or civics class I took. I was a timer for the National Finals, but I couldn't wait to get out of there and Google this new information.

On a slow work day, I can easily go down what the internet calls a Rabbit Hole. It's a metaphor for something that transports you into a wonderfully (or troubling) surreal state or situation. And darn it; Bock sent me down a troubling rabbit hole with this.

Bock went on to say that it was impossible to understate the role racial hostility played in incorrect Supreme Court decisions that fleshed out this nasty Territorial Incorporation Doctrine.

She said the Territorial Incorporation Doctrine was invented by Justice Ed White, a former Confederate soldier who publicly stated he did it because "we couldn't incorporate ten million black-skinned people like *that* in the United States. *Think* what the consequences would be." Just ugh.

This newsletter needs to be longer to do this topic justice like Bock did. And trying to condense this topic into an 8 to 10-minute speech is also not enough time. Bock said that one of the most incredible results of the Insular Cases was that any US citizen born of or residing in an American territory could run for President and become our Commander in Chief, yet, they cannot vote for themselves or any other candidate. What hypocrisy.

They can't vote for members of Congress either.

Pursuant to the Uniformed and Overseas Absentee Voting Act, US citizens who move from one of the 50 states to a foreign nation or outer space to serve on the International Space Station can still vote. However, if a US citizen moves within the US to Guam, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, or the Northern Mariana Islands, they lose their right to vote for as long as they live there.

Bock ends her speech with a plea that the Insular Cases MUST be overturned. She said we must use our voices to speak out against injustice and to rise together over adversity. And "When someone has fallen in the fight, we should shout out into the night for the rest of us to come and save them."

The American Legion has a strong voice.
Look how we advocate for POWs and MIAs.
Our Empty Chairs. Let's unite to speak out and help our comrades gain the right to

vote.

Greetings, fellow Legionnaires,

As you read this, we'll be just days away from what promises to be another great Department Convention. There'll be highly informative

classes at all levels, with attendees coming away armed with valuable information

that will make us a better, more effective organization. As you might guess, I'll spend a moment bragging about the 2-day Post Service Officer class. We've upgraded the course to place more emphasis on the importance of Post Service Officers' being as prepared as possible to be an all-around resource for the veteran community. In line with that, we'll also include some surprise guest speakers. I sincerely hope that as many of you have either registered or are sending a representative to the class.

As you know, as the PACT Act has taken effect, there've been more and more of our brother and sister veterans who've been able to at least begin receiving health care as well as filing compensation claims. Nationally, more than 3 million have received screenings for toxic exposure and other issues, with a large percentage recommended for further examination and treatment. Well, over 500.000 benefits claims have been filed under the expanded guidelines. I urge

everyone to take advantage of these no-cost screenings. In connection with healthcare, we are working on developing a source of no-cost dental care administered outside the VA healthcare system that will hopefully be accessible by ALL veterans. This is still in the works, but signs are positive. More information about this to follow as I receive it

We've all noticed that since the onset of COVID, there's been a noticeable increase in the number of veterans who have or are on the verge of facing homelessness. This has placed a strain on the availability of places for them to be placed. One excellent referral resource I've learned more, Mission United/

United Way. They have offices throughout the state and can be easily located. Please bear them in mind when (not if) you're presented with veterans who are in this situation.

Just a few tidbits resulting from the recent Spring Meetings held at National HQ that will affect us all:

The American Legion passed a resolution that launched a pilot program that will enable current and new members to sign up for either one or three-year membership, continuing the ability to become life members.

Beginning with the 2024 competition, the American Legion's High School Oratorical's

national contest will be held at Hillsdale College in Michigan. This change will bring with it some enhancements that will be advantageous to participants.

The National VA&R Division has contracted with a 3rd party to survey veterans regarding whether they prefer receiving healthcare through the VA or community care. This survey will begin shortly.

In closing this month's article, I'd like to take this opportunity to thank our current Department leadership for their tremendous efforts and contributions and welcome in advance the incoming leadership team. I look forward to seeing you all in just a couple of weeks.


